# It's Recreation Therapy Month

#### MEET VICKIE KORNELSON

Vickie is the Therapeutic Recreation
Manager for Williams Lake Seniors Village
and has been working in the role since
January 2023. Vickie has a degree in
Therapeutic Recreation and plans to
take the Certified Therapeutic Recreation
Specialist (CTRS) exam this year.

Vickie started her career in health care, working as a care aide for nine years. She then changed specialization and became a mental health and addictions recreation aide for six years before transitioning to her current role as a recreation therapist, which she's held for the past nine years. Vickie returned to long-term care because she saw a need for those suffering from mental illness, especially those making the transition into long-term care.

For fun, Vickie spends a lot of time with her dog, Daisy, a German Shepherd mix. Their favourite activities include going for walks, swimming and playing fetch. Vickie also loves art, painting in particular, and is captivated by the power of colour.

### Q: Can you tell us what a Therapeutic Recreation Manager does?

This is a big question in so many ways. I've spent a lot of time considering what I wanted my approach to this role to look like and how to accomplish the overall goals I have for myself and my team. I'd say a TR Manager is a coordinator, a supplier of needs (i.e. shop for supplies), an encourager of the team, both the recreation team and the overall team, and a supporter regardless of what is happening. There are

many details to the job, such as licensing requirements, calendar details, holiday planning, shopping requirements, budget, and bus/volunteer details. It's important to really know the residents and their preferences (both through my interactions with residents and input from the team). For example, what would be the most helpful for residents, as well as what is backed by evidence, are some of the core principles of effective programming. As a recreation therapist my core value is to look first at the resident, learn what they prefer and how to promote as much choice as possible. Of course, I also have the assessment, planning, interventions, and evaluation portions of the usual job of a recreation therapist, as well as encouraging this process in all aspects of

what the team does.

#### Q: What does your team mean to you?

My team is so important to the delivery of quality services. I have a team of eight when fully staffed, and they truly are the eyes and ears for their areas as to what is helpful and what isn't for the residents. My desire for my team is that they know the difference they make to the quality of life for the residents, are confident in what they are doing, have the support they need, and know that we will work together on areas that need tweaking, adjustment or learning. The best ideas are normally the ones that build on the strengths of everyone involved. Finding the balance between the activities the team loves to do and what residents respond the most to is a sweet spot in planning. An example is that I have a staff member who loves to play guitar and sing. She will come in and play in different neighbourhoods, so everyone gets a chance to experience her passion for music, and the residents love it and are so engaged. She's doing what she loves with the residents she cares for, and everyone is happiest.

My first year was focused on learning about WLSV, my rec team, and the team overall, which is a continuous process, but I was

focused on this area to learn as much as I could so that I could gain a better understanding of what has been working well and what needs adjustment. I wanted the team behind any changes so that we could evolve together to make the program what we want it to be.

### Q: What's been your experience working with West Coast?

I have found working here to be exactly the experience I sought when I was looking for opportunities after completing my degree. It's a chance to be a part of a leadership team that cares about the residents and the team and each other, knowing that if you have a strong team of managers, you can then build a strong team to support residents in the best way possible. It has been a big learning curve as I'm newer to the role of manager, so having my manager remind me to care for myself and be gentle with my own expectations has been a wonderful experience. I love that so much tangible effort is put into acknowledging the contribution of team members.

### Q: Do you have any favourite memories with team members or residents?

A bit of a background for this story with a resident. My family lived in Williams Lake years ago, even before I was old enough to go to school. I came to work, and in one of the first resident/family meetings I attended, one resident said, "Oh, I know your oldest sister." It turns out this resident is the mother of my oldest sister's best friend from high school, and my sister is still in touch with her! Small-town connections started even before I worked here. Not only that, but this resident also worked with my mom when they both were doing alterations for the dry cleaner that was here years ago, and they both remember one another. Generally, with

residents, if I can connect in some way with them, make them smile or laugh, I feel like I've made a difference.

A favourite memory with the team is one of the first times we were able to have one of my team lead a group smudging session for the residents. It was so important to our Indigenous residents to participate in their cultural practices, and I'm very proud of how that was facilitated.

### Q: What's the thing you enjoy most about working there?

I enjoy so many things about this job, one of them being the opportunity to try new things and to encourage others to try them too. One skill that my university preceptor really had was saying, "Let's try it," and then we'd sit and evaluate how it went. I want that for both my team and the residents. Frequently, people don't do things because they think they can't, or perhaps were told they couldn't, but when they try it, they really enjoy it and are better than they expected. Also, if you try something and it doesn't work, we can always try it again or wait until we have whatever was missing to do it again.

I enjoy the challenge of the details of the job, looking at the big picture of what we want from the program and having that big picture guide the small details of daily interactions. I'm working on the development of a comprehensive program plan that will guide our decision-making and bring an understanding of how the guiding principles/ core values of Retirement Concepts can be accomplished through the department's daily activities. It's definitely a bigger project, but it gives confidence and clarity to what a department can accomplish, and I found when I created this in another location, it gave me personal confidence in what I did each day.

### Q: Is there anybody here that you look up to?

I admire many people here. Many on the management team have years of experience in their roles, and I admire the volume of information they keep track of every day. I admire how Kim, my GM, is clear in her expectations, encourages self-care, and, above all, does her best to lead her interactions with kindness. I admire my team for their willingness to try new things and to keep in the forefront of their minds what is best for the residents in all their interactions.

### Q: Do you have advice for other people who might want to work here?

For people who want to work here, I'd say show up, do your best, ask questions, and don't be afraid to give your opinion when asked what you want to see for team appreciation.




### HAROLD ZELT DOGS OF WHITE ROCK CALENDAR


